THE CRY OF A LEPER. By William Wood

A diplomat posted to a large city in Asia was daily driven to and from his office in a big, white car. The car flew the flag of his country.

In the mornings the car sped through quiet streets while people were still sleeping on the pavements under the same cloth that on waking they would wind around themselves. They had nothing else. A few rich people, concerned at the effect of luxury on their health, and squeezed into white shorts and shoes, were taking their stomachs for a brisk walk along the promenade.

In the evenings the journey home took longer for the roads were jammed then with swarms of noisy black and yellow taxis, burping red buses, wobbly motorbikes and sedate scooters, long handcarts drawn by four-men teams, and cars older than their drivers.

All this traffic moved slowly and whenever it stopped at traffic lights, hawkers would flutter round the vehicles selling papers, magazines, roses thrown out by the big hotels, balloons, incense sticks and trinkets; boys would vigorously wipe windscreens with dirty rags and beggar girls would pinch their borrowed, snotty babies to make them cry and come whimpering at the car windows; lepers would whine for alms, displaying stunted and bandaged limbs, the deformed would slide perilously between the wheels on skateboards shouting up at passengers until the lights changed again. Then the ambush was lifted and with much joyful hooting the convoy would drive on under its own smoke screen.

Our diplomat soon learned to look straight through the mendicants, for not to see them was the only way to hold them at bay. He had another advantage. His car was air-conditioned so he could keep the windows closed and avoid the tugging and prodding of the thin and bony fingers.

Then one evening he was caught. He had been engrossed in an important despatch when, oblivious of his surroundings he glanced up and saw a smiling face. He smiled back automatically before he realised the smile belonged to an unshaven leper. The man looked hale enough, but he was disfigured by his disease. Of one hand only the stump remained, to which with a wire he had attached a tin mug. With the other fingerless and bandaged hand he gestured for money. It might have been a clumsy, cringing appeal, but it was not. It was the eloquent, economic statement of the practised mime and the leper's eyes met the diplomat's eyes man to man with no trace of self pity or of recrimination. It said, "I am poor. You are rich. This is how it is."

These impressions flashed through the diplomat's mind so quickly that his delving into a pocket, opening the window and tossing a clatter of coins into the tin was almost a reflex. The beggar raised the bandages to his forehead and inclined slightly as if to say, "You have made the right choice."

From that day on, whenever the big white car stopped at the traffic lights, the back window would open a discrete few centimetres and the diplomat would drop a coin into the leper's tin. And on occasions when there were important people in the car the man would not disturb them. Neither, noticed the diplomat, would any of the other beggars.

The diplomat began to anticipate his small act of charity with some satisfaction. It was good after a tiring day to exchange a secret smile with the leper. Each had his role to play and each performed it the best he could. When the security adviser reminded staff that they should vary the time and route of their journey to work, the diplomat thought the intelligence officer was merely doing his job, too, and took no notice of the warning. Besides such precautions were impractical in such a congested city.

One day the diplomat opened the window a little wider than usual and after depositing his coin, he quietly murmured to the astonished, weather-beaten face at his side,

"What's your name?"

"I beg pardon, sir?" asked the driver from the front seat, turning his head slightly.

"Oh, er, I just wondered what this fellow's name was."

"He has no name, sir."

"Come now, Anthony, he must have a name."

"No sir, that man not knowing talking, sir."

"You mean he is dumb?" The diplomat looked back out of the window but the lights had changed, the smoke and cacophony were rising and they slid forward with it. "A double misfortune, poor fellow," thought the diplomat to himself, though he did not understand quite how this deprived him of a name.

As for the leper, he counted himself fortunate. The sahib's alms meant not only regular meals, but when he occasionally received paper money it represented perhaps a whole day's work. He was too shrewd, however, to rely on the one source, for he had observed that foreigners soon move on.

In this he was proved right more quickly and dramatically than he had expected. On a couple of occasions he had noticed a well-dressed man, a shade too well-dressed, waiting at the bus stop across the road. The second time the man waited even after the bus had gone. The leper did not have time to consider the stranger's behaviour further because the white car with the fluttering flag and the friendly sahib came along and when it had gone, so had the waiting man, though no other bus had stopped.

The next time the leper again saw the man just as the white car was arriving. When it drew up in the queue the man ran across the road. He pulled something from the plastic bag he was carrying.

The leper darted between the disorderly rows of traffic to reach "his" car first. The diplomat looked round casually, expecting the usual smile. He only saw the leper's warning cry. For no sound escaped the contorted mouth. The bullets spat against the car and into something soft as the diplomat dived for the floor, shielded by the leper's body.
