WIN A WELL FED CHRISTMAS CAKE

It's coming up to that time of the year!

This year's Christmas cakes (yes there are going to be two) have been baked and continue to be fed a tablespoon of brandy every week ready for going

to a new home, after the School's Christmas play on <u>17th</u> <u>December</u>, (which is when the raffle will be drawn).

Many of you have supported this fundraiser over the years and so will be familiar with how to enter, but for those of you who are not, please read on.

Boxes, marked 'Win a Christmas cake' and some brown envelopes will be placed in the shelters at Crosby Ravensworth/Maulds Meaburn from early November.

To be in with a chance of winning, all you need to do is write your name and phone number on a brown envelope,



place £1 inside, seal the envelope and then pop it in to the box. If you want to have more than one go then just write out that number of envelopes.

The envelopes need to be in the boxes by **5pm on Sunday 14th December.**

The monies raised will go to the Friends of Crosby Ravensworth School to fund extra curricular activities for the school children, which they so enjoy and which enhance their learning experience. Even if you are not a fan of Christmas cake, why not write out an envelope for a friend or neighbour as a kind gesture.

GOOD LUCK everyone and thank you for your support CROSBY RAVENSWORTH RELIEF IN NEED CHARITIES

For those who know nothing at all, or very little, about the above Charities we would like to give you a little bit of information into who the Trustees are and as to what the Charities do. You can find this information plus more and a detailed list of all the charities in Teddy Relph's book "Chronicles of Crosby Ravensworth." Teddy served as a trustee (& treasurer) to the charities for 45 years, stepping down in 2019 at the age of 94 (four months before he died) The Charities - In today's welfare state, people might think that there was no longer any need for the old style charity. Even the trustees who still administer these various monies often find it difficult, in these days of comparative affluence, to decide who are the neediest. Some recipients would take all they could get, some even if in reduced circumstances are to proud or do not feel the need to accept what is offered to them. The charity commissioners are aware of this problem, and of the difficulties in interpreting the wishes of the benefactors perhaps 200 years ago, who lived in times when the poor were very poor and their needs obvious.

With these things in mind all ten charities formerly administered by the Parish Council (as successors to the overseers for the poor) were amalgamated in 1974 at the instigation of the then vicar, Revd. Ambrose Southward. Under the new title of 'The Crosby Ravensworth Relief In Need Charities' they are now administered by ten Trustees, that is the Vicar for the time being, Five appointed by the local Council and Four Co-opted. Communities would be responsible for the old people, the poor, the sick and infirm. Some of the work

of relief was carried out by great religious houses, in other cases gifts were doled out by the wealthier classes. Since the amalgamation of all the charities, we no longer have widows receiving loaves of bread at the church door, or Trustees trudging round the lanes with winter blankets. Yet it is felt that in spite of many changes the original intention of the doners, which was to help where the need was greatest, is still being carried out. Income comes from the rent off houses and land owned by the Charities. The bulk of this is given out in gifts and money to the elderly and sick by way of:-

- * The Winter Fuel allowance anyone of the age of 65 years and over and have lived in the Parish for 1 year or more are eligible for this. (This is paid per household NOT per person)
- *Gifts It used to be A Basket of Fruit for anyone who has been in hospital for at least Two nights, today there is a variety of gifts from fruit, flowers, plants, biscuits, chocolates or a voucher.
- *Help with travel expenses for people who are undergoing a course of treatment at a hospital so lots of travelling involved.
- *Small grants towards school uniform, for children within the Parish who are moving up into Secondary school (Applications must be made in writing to the Charities, stating which school they will be attending)
- *Small grants for students moving into further education to help with costs towards books etc. (Applications must be made in writing to the Charities stating what it is to be used for, Please give as much detailed information as possible)
- *A thirtieth of the net income of St Thomas Day charity is paid to the School Trustees.
- *Certain groups may be eligible for help towards buying equipment. (As above, needs a written application)
- *Property is repaired and Insured, while the rest of the income is re-invested to help provide for the future needs of the Community

Nursing Aids - The Charities hold a number of aids which anyone from the Parish can borrow at any time, free of charge.

Slotted bath seat, Shower chair, Shower stools, Perching stools, Swivel over bath seat, Grab rails, Toilet frames, Toilet seat raisers with frame, Toilet seat raisers without frame, Brown Commodes, Commodes on wheels, Commode liners, Blue nylon adjustable bed back rest, Over bed table, Over bed /chair tray, Under mattress straps and handles to assist getting out of bed, Kylie home and dry bed sheet, Folding tri-walker with shopping bag, Zimmer frames(folding, with or without wheels), Crutches and walking sticks, Stick aid for steps/stairs, Grabbers, Pedal exerciser, Pressure cushion, Rotating car seat, Sock aid, Adult bibs with waterproof backing, Table trolleys, Magnifying lamp, Back rest cushion,

Folding wheelchairs, Fixed chair raiser & individual chair /furniture raisers, Pack size 5 pads, Interlocking white plastic steps and a Reclining Armchair. March 1st....Boundary Mill, Colne, a favourite for shoppers. Top brands represented with lots of discounted goods for sale.

April 5th....Salts Mill, Saltaire, Shipley, Nr Bradford. Another visit to this interesting area with a village built by Titus Salt for his workers. The large Grade 2 listed mill building houses a David Hockney exhibition and numerous independent retail outlets, cafes and restaurants.

May 10th....Holehird Gardens, Windermere. A 10 acre garden managed by the Lakeland Horticultural Society with magnificent views to Lake Windermere and beyond. Entrance by donation.

June 7th....Abbotsford, the home of Sir Walter Scott. Situated on the banks of the river Tweed and set in magnificent formal gardens. A self guided house tour will be arranged.

July 5th....A visit to Haworth, the hillside home of the Bronte family. Visit the Parsonage that echoes with the legacy of its famed sisters and walk the steep cobbled streets of the village.

The approach to the market, a small clearing of beaten earth in the bush, was by a narrow path through a tunnel of grass which grew a man's length again above shoulder height. When people came the other way he or they stepped aside into the grass stalks to let the other pass, the Kawaja, as white men were called, muttering a nervous, "Hi there!" or "Hello." In most cases the incurious black faces would break into a smile and say "Good morning," or "Salaama" or utter some similar greeting. Most were old women carrying buckets of produce, plastic containers of water or sacks of charcoal on their heads. Of the men, one carried an axe, another a spear, but not in any menacing way.

The market was small and poor, obviously serving only the immediate vicinity. The fruit and vegetables were set out on the ground in little piles, here a few heaps of tomatoes, there a dozen purple sticks of sugar cane, some ground nuts, maize. One old woman had three pineapples, a man had some dark mounds of tobacco, enough to fill only a few pipes. The major activity was the meat stall where butchers hacked at the freshly killed flesh, chopping it on wooden blocks.

Despite the fact that white men were seldom seen in this area, no one took much overt notice of the nervous Kawaja stepping gingerly among the squatting vendors, the only person for fifty

miles around to wear shoes. He could buy the whole market, he thought, for less than one day of his consultancy fee, and there was nothing he wanted. Until he saw the ideal purchase and his eyes lit up. At last something really different, really ethnic, something to justify the long dusty journey.

"How much?" he shouted at a boy standing near it. The boy thus addressed froze, cast his gaze to the ground, not understanding and afraid to move. "How much is that?" repeated the man, pointing at the brown loaf, or cake as he guessed it to be. Another man stepped in, more alert, "Yes? What do you want?" he asked.

"That cake," said the expert pointing.

The man's eyes followed the direction indicated and he laughed aloud.

Others gathered, attracted by this spontaneous, incredulous but gay and unmocking laughter.

The white man smiled, caught up in infectious, harmless humour, said "I'll give you five pounds."

"Ten," said the man and the bystanders roared their approval.

"Seven," shouted the white man.

"Eight," replied the self-appointed vendor.

"Done," agreed the white man.

"Okay, all right is good," confirmed the vendor.



Then he hesitated for he realised no-one was going to wrap his cake, his authentic village delicacy. He bent to pick it up off the ground. It was crusty and brittle, difficult to carry without cracking and it seemed to have a soft centre. He raised it gently in both hands, laid it on one arm, his prize, his find, and eased his way through the people who stepped aside to let him pass, muttering now in astonishment as he walked off with his trophy, with his sun dried cow pat.


