We begin with an update from our sponsored walk which took place on 26th May. Whilst the day started off with some rain showers the sun did break through and the children thoroughly enjoyed their day. Some of you may have seen the children completing their walk. Thank you to everyone in the local community who offered generous support as ever. We're on track to reach our target of £1000 and half the proceeds of this year's walk will benefit the North West Air Ambulance appeal.

So, here we are in June and the children have just returned from their well deserved half term break.

This month's BIG news is that we have now gone 'live' with a promotional video for our school, showcasing all it has to offer. They will be exploring our beautiful countryside and recording everything they hear. After lunch they'll be listening back to the sounds and exploring what they have learned about nature. The children are very excited about this and we hope to share what we've heard through our website and facebook page.

The week beginning 21st June is a dedicated swimming week for all of our children in school and nursery, swimming being a vital and life saving skill.

'End of Term report' winter 2020/21

Our second year of tree and hedge planting was dominated by the effects of the Covid pandemic. Surveying was delayed by the first lockdown and further lockdowns meant we had to change the way we operated. No big group planting days, no mixing of volunteers and apprentices, and generally smaller working parties. However, with advice from Eden environmental health we were able to complete most of the work we had planned.

Survey work commenced in August and planting in mid-November. During the planting season 35 different volunteers totted up over 850 manhours.

Again we had great support from the YDNPA apprentices. They surveyed School Hill and Sideway Bank, installed fencing for hedging on Midtown, Brackenslack and Woodfoot, built a 20m x 5m fenced enclosure on Meaburn Moor, cut back and laid hedging at Flass and Midtown, as well as planting hedge plants at Flass and Low Row. In all another 370 manhours. We were also grateful for volunteer input from Eden Rivers Trust and Newton Rigg.

The headline statistics for winter 2020/21 planting are:-

2196 Trees

6723 Hedging plants making

1150 metres of Hedging

The total number of trees planted was boosted by a total of 515 following a late request from the Woodland Trust. Just when we thought we had finished for the year we were asked whether we would help planting for a woodland pasture scheme at Dyke Farm, Tebay. Twelve volunteers held their hands up and in the process we were paid over £200 towards next year's planting.

So another massive effort by all the volunteers - well done!

But we couldn't achieve any of this without financial support. This year we must give thanks to The Woodland Trust, Eden District Council, The Westmorland Dales Landscape Partnership (in turn supported by the National Lottery Heritage Fund) and numerous smaller donors.

In total they have contributed over £17,000 this year in cash and kind.

Coast to Coast?

Part IX

Yes, we were there again, at Manchester Airport sitting in the ARRIVALS lounge for a change, this time awaiting the arrival of Tom and Jane.

It was June 2019, and having booked a week in Cornwall for late September, we were looking to book another week either preceding that first week or after it somewhere else, possibly Devon or Somerset so that we didn't have the long drive back home to then return in a similar direction.

The best laid plans of mice and men....we had an email from Tom and Jane and I quote "J & T here, with some exciting news. We have been invited over to the 75th anniversary of my dad's plane crash" (During Sept 1944 her father, a navigator with Royal Canadian Air Force based at St.Eval in Cornwall took off in a Liberator on a training exercise to rendezvous with a submarine in the Irish Sea. Due to faulty radar the meeting never happened and the plane crashed into the Preseli hills in Pembrokeshire, Wales killing all but three crew, her father being one of the survivors) "And we're actually thinking of making the trip over to the commemoration and looks like we can fly into MAN around Sept 15th in the hope of perhaps spending a little time with y'all"

So not wanting to miss out on a trip to Wales we offered to collect them from the airport, book accommodation and hopefully get to see a little of them during this time - and then they invited us to the ceremony too. How could we resist? Gordon is ex RAF, my father had an association with Liberators during the war and I thought it wholly appropriate that we joined them. It did mean however that we would have to shelve our second holiday plans in favour of a week in Wales but to an area we didn't really know again!

This week became known as the September, Bonus, Breakaway, Dream Tour!

To mix things up a little, we booked the main accommodation about 25 miles from the commemorative event, which was to happen on Thursday 19th September, in a cottage in Brawdy - unbeknown to me it was next to RNAS Brawdy where Gordon had been stationed in his very early days of the RAF! So the plan was to collect the Dreamers from Manchester, drive to Chester and spend 24 hours unwinding in a

Premier Inn and a spot of sight seeing then moving on to Brawdy which is close to St.David's in south west Wales.

We waited, and waited, then heard them before seeing them as they laughed their way through to the arrivals area and once again the merriment began! Tom's beard was now approaching Father Christmas proportions and Jane looked a little tired but soon got into the swing beginning to chatter, asking questions, not waiting for the answers and saying, "Yes, I know, I'll shut up in a minute!"

It was good to be back in their company once more and although we had only parted the previous October in Toronto it seemed longer. Their plane was due in around midday and by 13.30 we were well on the way to Chester, then a quick check in after leaving the motor in a nearby car park and on to a walk along the city walls. We managed a couple of hours walking and doing the touristy things before finding a food stop, then went back to the Inn for them to rest and recuperate before more food at a very nice Italian place. Early night, breakfast at I think Cafe Nero's where Tom had porridge in a mug! And off we went, on our breakaway tour, into the middle of Wales stopping a couple of hours later at the most convenient bacon butty hut adjacent to a porta loo - perfect timing!!

The weather was warm and sunny and the forecast was good for the days ahead; it's never like this we kept telling them, it was wearing thin and they started disbelieving us!! We arrived at our very comfortable cottage in the middle of nowhere, near Solva which is renowned for a mill weaving beautiful designs into carpets, rugs, throws, purses, you name it, they'll do it! At one point Jane was seriously considering buying and transporting back to America with them a large runner of about 20' x 6'; fortunately Tom saw the logistical problems and talked her out of doing so! The next two days were spent exploring the area around St.David's and the fabulous deserted beaches locally which under blue skies were very inviting. We also paid a visit to Mrs Wills the Fish, who creates delicious platters of dressed crab meat, lobster meat, scampi and prawns; she was delighted to inform us (in her kitchen where she performs these miracles of deliciousness) that she had been shortlisted in the small business awards for Pembrokeshire. We later learned that she had been awarded third place and she was over the moon.

St.David's cathedral didn't disappoint - magnificent both in its architectural and spiritual attraction. The area around the "city" was bustling with tourists but car parking was plentiful and inexpensive, with several appealing hostelries and other food beckoning attractions! We spent around four hours there and returned via Mrs

Wills the Fish to collect our pre ordered platter which we were to consume for tea!
And that didn't disappoint either.

Thursday dawned and we were due to meet up with John Evans, the organiser of the commemoration at around 10.00 at the foot of the hillside; a primary school close by to the crash scene which remembers the event every year in their school curriculum had been invited to take part so there was a coach parked with 30 or so 10 year olds donning walking boots, delighted to be out of the classroom no doubt! We parked behind 20 or so other cars and waited for a short address by John and another gentleman then we began our climb up to the site where a plaque had been laid some years before to mark the area of the crash. Some of the wreckage is still in evidence and left untouched as a mark of respect.

A representative of the RAF was in attendance, a squadron leader from RAF Valley, Anglesey and together with four British Legion members carrying various emblems we all reached the vicinity within half an hour. A small service then ensued and a fly past had been promised but due to operational constraints and the heavy cloud base the intended aircraft didn't materialise but a smaller propeller aircraft we believe did fly over, albeit at a great height.

Along with Jane's presence representing the Canadian link, there were relatives from Australia and the UK in attendance and many stories and anecdotes were swapped during the following hours. We remustered at the local pub, then suitably refreshed and fed several of us reassembled at the cemetery in Haverfordwest where the War Graves Commission maintain four of the crews' graves. A small service took place then we all went back to John's house close to the town; an orchard, 15 beehives and a performing dog together with a power point presentation about various air crashes around the Pembrokeshire coast.

Eventually, after a very long day and indeed an extremely fulfilling one, we dragged ourselves back to the cottage before devouring a huge home made lasagne California style! The next day we drove to Pembroke Dock and the Flying Boat Museum of which John is the main supporter and fund raiser; I sat in a flight simulator of the Sunderland Flying Boat.....wow then we paid a visit to the Castle and learnt a lot about the history of the castle with many different marauding nationalities conquering and then being conquered by others! A very turbulent time.

We were leaving tomorrow so had another look at the beach at Newgale which stretches for ever into the distance; there was a film crew shooting something and we got one of the guys to take some photos of us with our kit!!

An early start and we drove up the west coast and then towards Llangollen where our nights' b & b was situated overlooking the end of the canal and a stones' throw from the Horse Shoe Falls of the river Dee. After we arrived we went for a walk to the falls; this is where in 1805 Thomas Telford diverted part of the flow from the falls into the newly built canal which hugs the hillside before turning 90 degrees south over the Dee in the form of the Pontcysyllte Aquaduct.

On returning to the town we sought out a fish and chip shop as we'd been building up Jane and Tom to the delights to be savoured....Pete's Plaice is superb but we ended up having to eat them in the cemetery opposite as we could not find anywhere else!

The following day was action packed as most days with the Dreamers tend to be; we arranged seats on the Llangollen steam trains plying up and down the 10 miles or so line. The weather had deteriorated by now so something indoors was welcomed; we clambered aboard, and delighted in the smell of coal, steam and oil and then got off at the other end for ten minutes before climbing aboard once more to be transported back the way we had come! Arriving back in Llangollen we drove a couple of miles towards the aqueduct, and parked close to the canal basin at Trevor.

A must do walk if you're ever in that area and Jane and Tom were thrilled to be walking across it by the side of a canal boat which was trundling along it; on their return we presented them with a Canal and Rivers Trust map of the inland waterways we purchased from the museum by the aqueduct, which Tom had kept asking about (I think they might have a cunning plan about to be hatched) - and then of course we went to find a pub in Trevor to consume even more food!

One More View from The Veggie Box!

June

Apologies for saying it hadn't rained since I couldn't remember when....I knew what would happen....and of course it did!! Sorry.

Perhaps when the deluge of May has subsided and flaming June begins to warm things up (I'm always the optimist if nothing else) then you might feel safe to venture outside again without many warm layers of clothing and galoshes to tend your flourishing veg patch.

I thought I'd pick, (sorry, no pun intended) another veg and give you my slant on it, so this time it's garden peas, with a few mange tout (eat all) thrown in for good measure. Preparation I guess is the best policy with peas as they thrive in good soil and can fail disastrously in poor, compost less soil - but the main element they really need is water. A couple of years ago I had the best bumper crop of both peas and mange tout ever but we did have excessive watering at the most appropriate times for these vegetables.

Incidentally, many of my pea pods don't make it to the dining table....can't think why?! They're irresistible, just waiting to be picked and you've got to try them, simply to make sure they're ready for harvesting haven't you?

I plant a couple of different varieties, namely Kelvedon Wonder and Alderman, but I'm not holding out much hope for the latter as they were very poor last year and I've only used them because I can't bear to throw away seeds!! So they've had their warning.

With mange tout I don't know what I've used as the bag disintegrated last season and I rescued them and simply labelled them as MT! Fingers crossed with that one then.

Peas grow best in a sunny and well drained spot, so avoid if you can growing them in very wet soils and if possible out of the gales. Grow bags or pots are also a good way of growing them if space is at a premium and can be grown quite close together - for example if growing in a 12" diameter pot you could easily plant 6 pea plants (or seeds) and keep 'em well watered so that their roots can access the nutrients needed for growth.

Supports are needed at an early stage as tendrils from the peas are looking for something to cling to. Twiggy sticks are the easiest way to support them but make sure you know approximately how tall the variety you're growing will reach. Alternatively some chicken wire supported at each end by bamboo sticks is just as good and reusable next year. Mange tout tend to grow a little taller so consider a wigwam support.

When the flowers appear look out for the pods, picking mange tout when they reach a medium size for best crunch and flavour; garden pea pods will begin as flat then fill out and need picking when the pods to touch are firm and rounded....don't forget, take them ALL inside to shell and cook!! Pinching out the growing tip to prevent the plant becoming too unmanageable around head height is recommended and it will also encourage side shoots, particularly with mange tout but common sense is always the best policy and if there's still another 3/4 inches left on the supports then leave them until that is reached.

At the end of the season leave the roots in the soil (if you've grown them in a veggie box or bed) as this will allow the nitrogen stored in their roots to stay in the soil. If you can, grow brassicas in this space next year as they'll really thrive on the nitrogen boost!

So now you know how to grow peas, I shall await your photographs of award winning efforts in the Link in due course! Happy growing and don't forget, enjoyment is the name of the game....

In response to the April Parish council minutes printed last month

Public Participation. Minute for 12th April

A resident had expressed disappointment at the felling of mature Lime Trees on farmland to the rear of Woodyard Crosby Ravensworth.

The felling of important trees went against the objectives of the tree group, it was said that the trees had been dangerous and that damage arising from falling overhead branches had occurred to the roof of a property in Woodyard. The trees were outside the conservation area and were not known to be the subject of a tree preservation order. I have included photos shown below.

Some photo's are missing due to a computer crashing, however the invoice for the broken window is included. The NFU insurance document proves the trees were dangerous. A landowner can be seen as negligent if dangerous trees cause damage to an adjoining property. Alarm bells started ringing immediately there was mention that the tree groups objectives be noted in the minutes. I asked for the minute to be sensitive, little did I know the full impact the said minutes would have, having lived in the village all my life, I find it very sad that I am having to defend not only family members but residents of the parish in this way. Hopefully the attached photos will allow harmony to be restored.

The trees were on my late Brother's land, that land is now in trust, the trustees intended to have the trees crowned, however on examination the arboriculturist found the trees to be too dangerous. I would like it noted that I am not a trustee, yet I have been accused of not declaring a pecuniary interest at the Parish council meeting, "I had no need to do so".. I have also been confronted in the village; the local handyman who ensured the trees did not fall on the properties has also been questioned.

I'm pretty certain the readers of this Link will have seen news reports and sympathised with city folks living with the fear of inflammable cladding. The residents, who have lived in the shadow of those trees, have likened the threat to living with that same inflammable cladding and not knowing when the threat is going to engulf them..

I have been a member of the Parish council for 15 years during that time the PC has resorted to fell trees if they are considered a danger to the public, the cost of felling trees is usually exorbitant and essentially dead money, nobody fells trees without good reason!. Other trees have been felled in the parish, which haven't come before the parish council, and yet trees which were a danger to life, felled by law abiding "trustees" have been singled out.

Health and Wellbeing along with protecting vulnerable members of this community is the thread of all my actions. As far as I recall the Parish Council's safeguarding policies have never been questioned, should a private landowners "trustees" actions be questioned, through the PC, for also safeguarding residents of this parish? That question coupled with the flack I have taken has resulted in me seriously considering my role in public life.

Planning YDNP E/03/15C/LB. Location; Holesfoot, Brackenslack Lane, Maulds Meaburn, CA10 3HX; Section 19 application to vary Conditions 2, 3 & 4 of E/03/15A/LB (listed building consent for internal alterations and for the installation of an external downpipe to the south east elevation) - In respect of alterations to the location of the ground floor east wing proposed bathroom door and amendment to second floor layout. NO OBJECTION.

Planning EDC 21/0292. Site address: LOW MOOR FARM, NEWBY PENRITH, CA10 3HB. Description: The formation of an earth banked slurry lagoon. The proposal was discussed at length. Correspondence had been received from a member of the public supporting the application and the potential it had to remediate a long-term problem with slurry leaks, spills and dirty roads. However, the correspondent also raised concerns over the intended location of the proposed slurry pit. It was said that a report regarding the choice

of location was not included with the application documentation. Concerns were also raised as to the assessed suitability of ground conditions, highway safety, pollution risks and landscape impact. The Council considered the correspondents comments. The councils resolved position was to raise NO OBJECTION to the proposed scheme.

Chairman's report, the Chairman's report is attached as Appendix 1. It having been circulated to councillors beforehand and published online and there being no members of the public present the report was taken as read.

The Chairman wished to add his thanks to fellow councillors, clerk and all the volunteers who helped keep up the Parish: Litterpickers, Shelter Managers, Swing Painters & Grassmowers and all those whose voluntary efforts helped keep the Parish in good order.

Public Participation.

Councillors raised issues from the public as follows:

1. Cllr N Hughes, works to the road to Shap had been delayed by limited availability in respect of the Jet Patcher. In response to a query, he noted that issues regarding Stiles should be referred to David Gibson at Cumbria County Council.
2. It was RESOLVED to look into issues regarding potential disabled parking in Maulds Meaburn connected to the promotion of level access walks (DG. JR. VH. RM to confer)
3. Flags were being installed to the ground at the CR Post Box to facilitate disabled access.
4. A resident had expressed a wish to plant a memorial tree in Maulds Meaburn DG & RM to liaise.
5. A visitor to the area had reported a river pollution incident to the Environment Agency resulting in an inspection.
6. A Coffee Van had begun trading on Maulds Meaburn VG. Councillors preferred the vehicle to be parked on the highway and suggested some possible sites. Feedback would be given.

7. The Fellgate Cattle grid had been cleaned out.

Appendix 1

Parish Council Chairman's Report, Cllr D Graham, May 2021.

Meetings - The Parish Council (PC) held 11 meetings over the 2020/21 year with all meetings from March to July cancelled due to Covid 19 lockdown. During the lock down period PC business was undertaken by the Chair and Clerk through Delegated Powers whilst consultation on planning submissions was made by email.

The government introduced legislation to allow online video conference meetings for Councils and this is due to expire on 7 May 2021.

A single face-face meeting was held in August 2020 before all PC meetings moved online via Zoom. All were scheduled in advance and mostly held on the first Monday of the month. In all 3 members of the public attended during the year despite the meeting Zoom link details being publicised on the Agenda and Parish Website.

Councillors – There are currently 5 elected Councillors; David Graham (Chair), Joan Raine (Vice Chair), David Hewitt, (Ginny) Holroyd, Andrew (Pandy) Beatham. In addition there are 2 co-opted Councillors; Rob McIvor and Stuart Roberts the latter co-optee replacing Jonathon Taylor who stood down at the September meeting.

Planning - The PC is a consultee on all planning applications in the Parish. In total 32 Planning applications were submitted which was a 128% increase on the previous year.

Of the 17 Eden DC planning applications 9 were all associated with Winter Tarn Farm. All the applications were approved under delegated authority by the Eden DC Planning Officer. The PC had objected to 2 of the applications which should have resulted in the application going to Planning Committee and another 5 were determined in advance of PC consultation.

The PC has received no response to letters to the Planning Department, Director or Chief Executive and has now formally lodged a complaint against the Authority.

Finances - The PC had £22,435 of income and £14,954.73 of expenditure, the latter closely managed and significant savings made on planned works. The surplus has allowed the replenishment of General and Police House Reserve accounts which were severally depleted during the previous year with major upgrade works required before re-letting of the Police House.

At the end of the 2020/21 year account balances are as follows:

- 1 Current Account £5,552.82
- 2 General Reserve £9,543.01
- 3 Police House Reserve £7,025.33

The Parish Council Precept for 2021/22 (Band D property) remained unchanged at £54.04 per chargeable household providing the Parish Council with £12,440 of income.

As a taster, some of the key issues discussed and actioned over the last 12 months include;

Registration of Parish land – Following the successful first Land Registry registration (Maulds Meaburn Village Green) the PC lodged an application to register Reagill Village Green. This application has yet to be determined with delays attributed to Co-vid.

The PC has continued with it's agreed approach to Maulds Meaburn Village Green with a number of new householder agreements instigated as formal Deeds.

Old Police Station – The planned external painting work was completed during the summer of 2020.

Crosby Ravensworth Commons – The Commoners' submission to Natural England for the 10 year management agreement for the Crosby Commons was completed during the year.

The commoners who have rights to graze specific numbers of stock on the fell have developed a scheme that reduces grazing and increases tree cover. The public had a right of access to the common and the submission aims to balance the needs and rights of all concerned with the establishment of areas of planting.

The PC was consulted, both in its role as the owner of Bank moor, and as a statutory consultee. The PC fully supported the submission and has signed the formal agreement to allow the inclusion of Bank moor.

The submission is currently with the Secretary of State awaiting full approval.

Holly Cottage – In August Councillors were advised of a bequest, in the will of the Late Ted Relph (A former Chairman of the Parish Council and lifelong resident of the Parish), of his home 'Holly Cottage', the bequest was conditional upon the Parish Council making the cottage available for rent. It was a 3-bedroom family home.

The PC employed Lewis Conservation to carry out a Condition Survey and develop a budget for costs associated with the refurbishment of Holly Cottage. This was completed on 5 December 2020.

The refurbishment proposals cover all aspects of the property and are aimed at achieving a minimum Energy Performance band of E whilst also conserving the character of the property. The overall costs of the works are estimated at circa £150,000.

The PC can access funding via the Governments Public Works Loan Board (PWLB) as refurbishment of Holly Cottage would be classified as capital works.

The PWLB gives the PC access to a maximum of £500k borrowing over up to 50 years. For the likely funding required for refurbishment interest rates would be fixed at 1.53% over 25yrs to 1.91% over 50 yrs.

Analysis of loan costs versus potential income from rental clearly demonstrated financial viability and the return of surplus to the PC's accounts.

One of the requirements of the Public Works Loan Board application, even though the PC has no intention of increasing the precept to cover some of the works cost of the project, is that the community must be informed / consulted on the proposed scheme and borrowing. Consultation was carried out through the Lyvennet Link and PC website and is still open for comment. Parish Councillor's unanimously agreed to acceptance of the bequest.

Unitary Authority – The proposals for the creation of a new single or two unitary authorities across Cumbria to replace the current County and six District Councils closed on 19th April 2021.

Proposals.

Allerdale + Copeland Proposer

Area 1 [Copeland + Allerdale + Carlisle] Area 2 [Barrow + South Lakes + Eden].

Carlisle + Eden Proposer

Area 1 [Allerdale + Carlisle + Eden]
Area 2 [Copeland + Barrow + South lakes].

South Lakeland + Barrow Proposer

Area 1 [Copeland + Allerdale + Carlisle + Eden] Area 2 [South Lakes + Barrow + Lancs Morecambe Bay Area].

Cumbria County and District functions absorbed into a new single Unitary Authority.

The decision on the future shape of Cumbria's local government now sits with the Secretary of State.

It is anticipated that should a unitary proposal proceed then any new Authority or Authorities formed will look to shed all non-statutory functions and attempt to push some services down to the most local level; Parish and Town Councils. MMVG Inspection – Following an inspection of Maulds Meaburn Village Green in Feb 2021 various elements of work have been identified:

- 1 Bus shelter – Replacement of timber, repair guttering and repainting – quotes being sought
- 2 Highway maintenance issues including numerous potholes, damaged pedestrian fencing, cattlegrid clearance – Cumbria Highways has been notified.
- 3 Mill Race and sluice gate – repair and clearance subject to Historic England approval as they are listed as an Ancient Monument
- 4 The damage to the Green from tractor parking and turning is being re-instated by the driver
- 5 Exposed water pipe across river upstream to top footbridge – United Utilities investigating removal.
In addition YDNPA are progressing plans to undertake work with the riverbank willow at Bridge House.
Grants – The Parish Council awarded grants to the following organisations during the year
- 6 Parish Tree Group - £440

7 Crosby Ravensworth First Responders £300

8 Fell Runner bus - £300

Administration - The Parish Council received an unqualified audit with no matters arising.
