Progress on Crosby Ravensworth Play area.

After hours of work, fund raising, filling in forms and site visits by a dedicated team we are pleased to announce the preparation work is due to start in March for the first phase of the play area.

The two new pieces of equipment are due to be installed during the week starting the 3rd of April.

The aim is to have the play area closed for as short a time as possible, the committee apologise that the installation period clashes with the Easter Holidays.

The footpath will also be closed as due to the lack of space, the area outside the gate will become part of the building site.

Fundraising will continue for the second phase, but due to an agreement with EDC some pieces of equipment cannot be replaced until after October 2027.

The play area renovation committee wish to thank everyone who has helped us reach this milestone in such a short time.

Report for local newsletters, end of an era for EDC

On the first of April, Eden District Council will no longer exist, good luck to the two councillors who are replacing four local EDC councillors the new councillors will be accountable to 17 parishes in the Westmorland and Furness council .

The new Westmorland and Furness council, covers a massive area from Alston in the East to Barrow in the West, the whole of South Lakeland and all of Eden district, there will be a local committee for each area, Parish councils will become more important than ever to get the local voice heard.

Please get to know your councillor and make them aware of the issues which concern you, once elected, councillors work for the whole of the council they represent, firstly and foremost they are accountable to the people who voted for

them. Politics is a messy business and not for the faint hearted, you can certainly lose friends when you stand up for the people, who voted for you,

As serving Chairman of the scrutiny committee, I was invited to attend a scrutiny meeting with the new Westmorland and Furness authority, top of the WAF agenda, is Children's services and Adult social care.

I was elected in 2006 at a by-election I have served the Crosby Ravensworth ward for nearly 17 years. Consisting of four parishes, Crosby Ravensworth, Asby, Bolton and Kings Meaburn . My only agenda was to serve the people I represented to the best of my ability; it was a steep learning curve! At the last EDC election, I was proud to receive the second highest majority votes in the whole of the Eden district. "Phil Dew of Kirkby Stephen held the top position"

While many folks think councillors do nowt, the majority of their work is hidden one of my proudest achievements as an EDC councillor is the outcome of a scrutiny review I suggested, aware of the lack of disabled accessible transport in the district. The results of that review were forwarded to the Government and resulted in a disabled lift at Penrith station. This involved numerous partnerships led by Rory Stewart and his team. Another review I chaired was the ambulance response times, this resulted in retaining the rapid response vehicle in Penrith, a second review on the subject was due to come back before the scrutiny committee, but never happened due to covid.

Serving as Chairman of the district council for two years was a real honour, as was breaking with tradition by bringing the EDC carol service out of Penrith and holding it in Crosby Ravensworth Church, showcasing the Church and the community pub to civic dignitaries, raising much needed funds for the Church during troubled times.. Sadly the first year's carol service had to be cancelled due to adverse weather conditions.

I opened the Sainsbury's store, New Squares, was and still is a controversial subject, with the increase in population in Penrith, the store is well used, Sainsbury's stranglehold on who can lease the empty shops is the issue. After the fire I opened Morrison's store, in the entrance behind the recycling bin is a plaque with the details and the date of the re-opening .

I hope that somewhere along the line my hidden input has benefited you in some small way. It has been a real privilege to serve my community and I thank you all for supporting me and giving me that opportunity. **Kind Regards Joan Raine.**

CROSBY RAVENSWORTH PARISH ARCHIVE

The Crosby Ravensworth Parish Archive was established over 20 years ago. Around the millennium there was a regular community group who worked on projects about local history, but this group has now dwindled. The archive holds a wealth of information on the history of the parish, many houses and local families.

Lots of local groups have placed their historic information in the archive to make use of it as a storage facility e.g. CRVH, MMVI, CR school, young farmers and the Parish Council.

The archive property is owned by the Crosby Ravensworth Charities. Crosby Ravensworth Parish Council has a lease with the archive which expires in 2027. The Parish Council currently supports the archive financially by paying the insurance, rental for storage of parish council documents and the electricity and water bills. The Parish Council no longer meets in the archive because there is insufficient room for the public attending meetings.

With the increase in electricity prices in the past year the total cost to the Parish Council of supporting to the archive is now approximately £3,000 a year. This is over 20% of the parish council's regular annual income.

The Parish Council is liaising with the Parish Charities to address the situation. The Charities do not want to see the Archive close and at their next meeting in May will look at how they can offer some financial support.

The Parish Council are planning for the future and would like to know the views of members of the community about their archive arrangements and expenditure.

Andy Airey is born & bred in Cumbria and has spent much of his life living, working and playing on and around the Lake District fells. He lives with his family, Fiona & Gregor, in the Eden valley. Their lives were sent on a completely unforeseen trajectory when daughter, Sophie, took her own life on December 19th 2018.

In looking for a charity to support for Sophie's funeral they came across PAPYRUS, the national charity dedicated to the prevention of young suicide. PAPYRUS seemed the perfect charity to support in their darkest time and they were determined to bring something positive out of the utter devastation of losing Sophie.

Since then, Andy has joined forces with Mike and Tim, whose daughters had similarly taken their own lives, to undertake several epic challenges in a bit to get suicide prevention integrated into the school curriculum and to raise funds for PAPYRUS. Their [3 Dads Walking](#) campaign has seen them trek across the UK to raise awareness of young suicide and raise over £1m for charity.

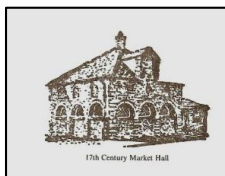

Lyvennet Cookbook

Sausage & Apple Pie

1lb /500g sausages taken out of their skin

1 large eating apple

1 medium onion chopped

¾ pint chicken / veg stock

2oz /50g butter

Good splash of olive oil

2lb /1000g potatoes

6oz / 150g cheddar cheese.

Method

Use a frying pan sauté the onion in the butter & oil.

Slice the sausages in half not cutting all the way through & press into the pan to brown on each side.

Add a peeled a sliced apple.

Cook for around 10mins turning the sausage now & then.

Add the stock & stir for a few minutes.

Boil & mash the potatoes season with butter , salt & pepper.

Place the sausage mixture in a casserole dish.

Top with the mash & grated cheese over the top.

Bake at 180c 350f for 25mins.
