





### A Look in the Past

Following on from our previous delves into the book 'Some Westmorland Villages', compiled in 1957 by members of the Women's Institute throughout the county, this month we move onto 'Blacksmiths' in our two villages.



In former years Crosby Ravensworth had two forges and Meaburn certainly had one. Taking Crosby first, we had both Richard Johnson and George Nicholson, each with plenty of trade.

Thomas Johnson was a blacksmith at what was then called Top Smithy, over the bridge from the Post Office, early in the C19th, and himself lived at the Butcher's Arms.

He specialised in the shoeing of heavy horses and made all the shoes at his forge. Often there was a queue of horses waiting to be shod, at busy times of the year, such as ploughing time, hay-time and harvest.

In frosty weather many horses came to be "sharped", that is to have iron studs hammered into their shoes to prevent them from slipping.

Before <u>Brough</u> Hill Fair and the June fair at Appleby, many fell ponies came to the smithy to have two shoes put on the fore-feet ready for their walk to the fair, as there were no cattle wagons in those days for their transport.

Sometimes there would be six or seven ponies all running about loose in the smithy at the same time and all wildly excited.

Thomas Johnson had a tame fox for a pet, and the children loved to come with their elders to the smithy to see the pretty little creature. In addition to his work as a blacksmith he was a very clever amateur "cow doctor" and his services were in great demand over a wide area. Indeed, in 1865 he was presented with a silver tea-pot "as a token of esteem for his gratuitous veterinary services"!

He made no charge for his work, only taking pay for his medicines and appliances. He was a skilled worker in iron and when Flass was being built he did much of the work there and his descendents tell of him that, working against time, he on several occasions got up as soon as Sunday midnight was past and worked from then for three days, with only short periods of sleep, then one full night's sleep on the fourth night, then three more long days and so on until he caught up on his work.

Thomas was followed after his death by his son Richard, who like his father, as well as being a thoroughly good blacksmith was also an excellent "cow doctor" and put in much time at night riding on horseback to various farms to doctor sick animals.

He was <u>specially</u> good at "<u>fettlin</u>" up a plough" as it was called in those days, making the ploughshare sharp and true.

A blacksmith's job was very arduous in the old days and needed a strong man to stand it. After Richard Johnson's death, his son Thomas, carried on the business, he found after a while that it was affecting his health adversely and so he gave up the smithy and became a farmer.

He farms at <u>Tenter</u> Row and "Johnson's Smithy" is now used as a shed and a henhouse.

George Nicholson had a forge near the church gates and as one who specialised in very beautiful ornamental <u>iron-work</u>, he made some for the church at the time of alteration and re-building.

The scroll-work of the alter rails is a sample of his fine work and is said to resemble the iron-work in York Minster.

His too are the lamp brackets which are now solely ornamental. He had a reputation too for his shoeing of light horses which he is said to have done to perfection, but he did not like to shoe heavy horses.

He lived, unmarried, with his sister and after his death Harold Dalton took on the forge for a short time.

George Nicholson belongs to the period covering the latter part of the nineteenth and the early part of the twentieth century.

After Harold Dalton gave up, the business was taken over by Henry Pigney, son of the Kings Meaburn blacksmith. However, in the course of time, with changing demands, he decided to give up the working of the smithy in Crosby and now has his main business at Appleby and Kings Meaburn.

On one occasion when clearing an old chimney of his house, which had been stopped up with crows' nests, he found a new horse-shoe which showed an improved method of "sharping" a horse without removing the shoe.

Possibly George Nicholson intended to patent this and hid it away in case it might be stolen. Guess work perhaps, but a gifted craftsman such as he was might have been experimenting with new ideas.

Harry <u>Pigney's</u> father, grandfather and great grandfather were blacksmiths and the tale is told of the last having a momentous journey to Kendal to buy a fresh supply of iron.

He started off in good time in the morning, intending to complete the journey in a day, with his mule and cart, so as to have to pay toll once only in the twenty-four hours at Shap Toll-bar.

Soon after he left the Toll-bar he was attacked by foot-pads but laying about him in good earnest he wounded one robber whilst the other made off!

He then carted the injured one to Kendal and handed him over to the authorities for punishment.

He had a good supply of money, in gold, with him, to pay for the iron, there being no cheques in those days and he was fortunate to arrive with it intact.

On later journeys he always took someone with him for company and protection. In the days before tractors, when the joiners made the farm carts, the blacksmiths made the iron-work and cast the iron hoops for the wheels.

Outside the forge at Crosby can still be seen the old "hooping" plate on which the wheel was laid to be hooped. Horse ploughs were also made, the ploughshare requiring a very careful and skilful job of work and two socks were for every plough. Amongst other things done by the blacksmith in former times were making hoops for water-barrels and churns, repairing ovens and relining them with iron when they wore out. Making box-irons and the heaters to go inside them, "caulkering" clogs and making the "caulkers" for them, and when he had a slack time (!) he used to make sets of horse-shoes.

In the summertime he would often employ itinerant blacksmiths, roaming about the countryside in search of casual work, to make horse-shoes of various sizes at so much a dozen. Here it might be mentioned that in the good old days it cost 8d to remove four shoes as against 17/3d now and four new shoes then cost 1/9d now they cost 35/0!

The coals for the smithy fire had to be carted from Shap station or from Temple Sowerby, and the farmers, who were very dependent on their blacksmith used to have a "boon carting" to ensure a good supply for him! The smithy bellows were worked by hand, at first, then a blower worked by water power was invented, and now that is out of date and an electric bellows used. In the same way iron welding has been superseded by electric welding or acetylene welding as it is called.

After the first world war much of the work formerly done by the village blacksmith came to be done by big engineering firms, and with the replacing of the horse by the tractor the blacksmith's work, as originally understood, declined. Now he has to be farm machinery mechanic.

A little can be said here about Maulds Meaburn smithy. The village has not had a blacksmith for many years, one Joseph Wetherell is mentioned in an old directory of 1894, but appears to have brought work to Crosby. There is the old blacksmith's forge standing, now used as the joiner's workshop, as apart from the saw-mill. It is an interesting old stone building, standing close to what is known as Forge Cottage, where the blacksmith lived and noticeable for carved stones set in to the walls. One depicts a very solid farm-horse being shod by a rather over-shadowed blacksmith and another with the initials and date C.B. 1844 has also a hammer, pincers and nail.

This refers to Christopher Bowman, then the village blacksmith, noted for his skill, but noted to as a local poet.

A gap in the surrounding blackened wall is all that is left to remind us that it was once a forge.

# THE POWER OF MUSIC by William Wood

"Give me one reason why I should not kill you," said the general.

"Hand me my guitar, then," said the prisoner. Though bloodied and in torn, soiled clothing he spoke with authority. A uniformed guard stood on either side of the chair to which he was secured

The general faced them seated the other side of a table that served as his desk. He had not expected such quiet defiance from a man long interrogated. He hesitated.

"Are you serious?"

"Pass me my guitar," repeated the prisoner through broken teeth.

"Very well." The general gave an order to one of the guards. The guitar was brought in. The prisoner's arms were freed and he received it with concealed pleasure, almost fondling the neck of the instrument as he settled it across his body. Tentatively he brushed the strings and with a look of concern said, "I shall need to retune it."

"I will give you five minutes. Then you will play for your life." He left the room while the prisoner inspected his battered instrument, made some adjustments and tightened several of its twelve strings.

When he re-entered the room the general ordered the two guards to come round to his side of the table and to sit facing the performer.

The prisoner did not look up. Judging his audience to be ready he began with a loud flourish of dissonant chords, a musical scream of anguish, a scream of pain and of rage. Startled into immediate attention the general recognised at once this man's technical ability. The cynical smirk left his face. He had not expected the improvisation that followed. The music expressed the prisoner's anger and despair, but it also reflected the general's own unease. When with a few

plangent chords the music changed and a sad melody echoed off the bare walls of the grim cell, the general fought his own emotion.

The musician always tried to imitate the human voice, in his opinion the best musical instrument of all, but speech has already failed. When true inspiration came he forgot about his fingers and his tapping feet. It felt to him like a sensation of control, of domination. His task was to drag out the feelings, the suffering, the protest from where he did not know. He was only the medium and as the rhythmic music persisted it set up a magical flow, a stream of meaning. The prisoner was lost in his music making, unaware of his cell, of his confinement, of the importance of this recital.

After the abuse he had suffered in prison, to hold his guitar was both a release and a comfort, like returning to a mother, to a lover. And that love came through. He was playing now for humanity. He was playing a universal song of love.

The general was engrossed. At first the music had dredged up his personal feelings of guilt and disgust but now he was close to being overwhelmed by the beauty of what he was hearing. This man was dangerous.

When the maestro stopped playing he let the guitar fall into his lap and bowed his head. He was soaked in sweat and tears, exhausted.

One of the guards had almost failed to restrain himself from applauding, the other muttered "bravo" under his breath.

With moist eyes the general met the prisoner's gaze, acknowledged his performance with the slightest of nods and said to the guards,

"Set him free. But before you do so, cut off his left hand"
