NEWS FROM CROSBY RAVENSWORTH C OF E SCHOOL

Well, we are back from the summer break and although we are only 4 weeks in to the Autumn term, we have already got so much to tell you about.

Class 1, in the first full week back, enjoyed a visit to Meaburn Hall where they met the McPhee's goats. Harriet McPhee led the children in a goat grooming session and there were also lots of opportunities for holding and cuddling the baby goats too! The children also got to meet some other animals on the farm. They all had a lovely day and thanks once again to Hattie.

Continuing our understanding and celebration of farming in Cumbria, children in class 1 and 2 had a day out of school, to visit the Westmorland Show on 14th September. There was more petting of animals; a chance to sit in and look around a fire engine; explore the art and crafts on display.....and Mr Priestley even had a go at axe throwing (away from any children!). It was a fantastic day with lots of memories made to take away.

Our footballers and netballers have also participated in a very competitive inter-school challenge at Morland. It was then the turn of our rugby players in the Long Marton Rugby tournament. Reflections given at the 60th Anniversary Thanksgiving for Crosby Ravensworth School, Sunday 24th September 2023 Revd Stephen Tudway

Introduction

Ten years ago, the community gathered to give thanks for 50 years of our school in its present form. This year we are privileged to gather again, to mark 60 years. Time has passed. Pupils have joined us, pupils have left us, progressing to secondary education. Our school is at least as strong today as it was before, and we commend it to God's protection, and pray that many of us will gather again in 10 or 15 years time (for the 75th) to celebrate its continuing vitality.

We structure our service around thanksgiving for past and present and looking to the future. We do this together, because we are community, and our school is a community within our community. Together we are grateful for what has placed us where we are. We are grateful for those who sustain us now. We look with hope to the future we will strive to create.

Our music today has been specially selected to be both nostalgic and modern, and to reflect the life of schools everywhere. It is all drawn from the BBC hymn book, *Come and Praise*, published in 1978, and in print ever since. I think they may have got rid of the 1970s brown cover, but Mr Priestly still has an original. Whether or not we like it them, for those of us who attended primary school from the late 1970s onwards,

or had children or grandchildren during that time, these hymns have furnished the soundtrack if not of youth, then at least of education.

Giving thanks for our past

Our first Bible reading speaks of building on firm foundations. It is no idle exercise to be thankful for what is past. Ten years ago, the late Ted Relph gave a potted history of the school. Today, we can refresh our memory in the finest detail, thanks to the extraordinary displays which Jill Winder has created for us. The Book of Isaiah tells us that God knows each of us, by name, and counts every hair on our head. Jill's displays give us access to that power of names, and I invite you to spend this reflection noting down the people and events of the past which form your memories.

When we learn to read, we start from the absolute basics. The letters, the phonic sounds, the words and their spellings, sounding them out. We start from the beginning. Or do we?

In fact, we do not ask where our words came from, the languages that came before. The study of etymology is something that only a few pick up, as a specialism, much later. We do not need to trouble, when we learn to read, about Middle- or Old-English, or any of the Indo-European forebears of English, because everyone today is speaking the contemporary English which has evolved over centuries, even millennia, from its predecessor languages. Even when we seem to start with the basics, we are really starting with something handed down to us ready for use.

The Romans had a word for this: *tradition*, literally that which is handed over. Our word tradition comes directly from it. Tradition sometimes gets a bad name. It has become associated with old-fashioned or outdated things, things accepted without reason. But all of human life depends upon what is handed down to us. When we reach a river, we seldom need to build a bridge from scratch. When we want to travel, we do not need to reinvent the wheel. We have all that we need, ready to hand, because we have all that has been handed down to us in terms of material things, and also in terms of knowledge. When we study science, we do not repeat, in order, every experiment that has progressively revealed the world. In most lifetimes, we would never reach the cutting edge if we travelled in that way. We sometimes need to accept what has been learned, what has been tried and tested, in the past. It enables us to leap forward, to the front, to continue the march of progress.

Just because something has been handed down, does not mean that it is right (any more than all our formative memories will be positive), but we do not have the time, we would be overwhelmed, if we had to question everything. Our society is built upon accepting and being grateful for what is handed down to us, until circumstances cause us to question and adjust it. If we are faithful, honest and kind, things may, very gradually, get better and better and better. If we abandon everything that has gone before, anarchy and evil are much more likely outcomes, than a fresh and better start.

Our school is built on firm foundations. It is built upon three or more centuries of church schools, built with local funds, when no-one else would provide an education for local children. It is built upon its predecessors, the tiny village schools that went before. It is literally built, an attractive (if modern) feature of the landscape, steadily subject to careful maintenance, and to important additions for learning through play, through sport, through an enjoyment of the outdoors. It is filled with equipment, materials, musical instruments.

Buildings, and exercise books, and computers, and equipment, of course, are not enough. The real foundations are the people who have shaped our school, who have shaped our learning. The people who have taught, the people who have learned alongside us, played alongside us, cried alongside us.

Remember your headteacher, your teachers, the school staff who administered the office, cleaned, cooked, served and supervised, kept the building and the grounds, governed and planned. The people who visited, who you met on trips. Give thanks for them all.

Remember in particular fellow pupils. The classes and the playtimes shared. The books and the games. Indoors and out. (The deer skeletons and the stuffed animals!) Give thanks for them.

Remember those who are no longer with us. The staff and pupils who have passed away, through age and occasionally through tragic loss. May they rest in peace, and rise in glory. Give thanks.

Giving thanks for our present

We take time to reflect on the present. What is special and unique about the way we now are?

There are 16,790 other open primary schools in England this year. We are the 16,791st. What is it about us?

There are very few schools, even in Cumbria, as small as ours. In the South of England, I was once the governor of a primary school nearly 20 times size of ours. For every pupil, for every member of staff that we have here, that school had another 18 or 19. It made some things much easier. There were always adults to cover an absence, children to fill in places on every kind of team.

When we are running a business, it's generally good to be big. And sadly, there are aspects of running a school these days that are a bit like running a business. It's not as easy to make your way in that world, when you are very small.

But when you are running a community, or a family, small is good. Relationships thrive when we can afford to give them time, and attention. And when we are in relationship with one another, we learn from one another and we take care of one another. There is a terrible tendency in the world today to reject the other, to reject the one who is not like us, who looks or thinks or believes differently to us. When we know each other well, differences become something to celebrate, rather than fear.

So we give thanks for our small school, because it means we know one another well. We talk to one another. We help one another. We serve one another.

We also give thanks for our remote school, because it means that our community is distinctive, and small enough to know well. We give thanks for our beautiful surroundings. They inspire our creativity, but they also keep us grounded. We know our food, our mineral resources, where our harvest comes from. We see the weather in all its forms. We know days when the sun shines on our fields and woods. We know days when snow blocks the road, or the river reaches the top of its banks.

In our school today there is as rich a variety of learning and activity, of spirituality and science, of study and sport, of music and art, as you will find in any primary school. Our circumstances are unusual, but so is our breadth and our ambition. We do not pretend that everything can be rosy all of the time, but we hope that we are equipping ourselves as well as anyone can, to meet everything and everyone that we encounter, in love and strength.

So we give thanks for all our present staff, pupils, parents, governors and supporters, for all that you contribute to our school, to the life of the children and adults in our care. We give thanks for the wider community, for its support of the school. We give thanks for the church, and the Diocese, within which the school is treasured, alongside many others.

Looking with hope to our future

In our third reading, God tells us not to be anxious about the future. But he doesn't tell us not to care.

In this life, Jesus promises not punishment for wrongs, nor reward for loyalty, not the crutch of jam tomorrow. He promises hope: hope for the life to come, but also this life. He promises abundant life, life in

all its fulness (John 10:10). Our school vision is rooted in that teaching: "I have come in order that you might have life; life in all its fullness."

Like other schools, we face many pressures: fluctuating birthrates and fluctuating rolls; lack of funding; extraordinary demands and expectations; a constantly changing landscape of reorganisation through academisation. Through all of this we will navigate and we will not be anxious. We will continue to love learning and we will continue to seek after life in all its fulness: flourishing for every child, and adult, in our school community.







MMVI Talk Programme

120 villagers and visitors from further afield filled Maulds Meaburn Village Institute on Saturday 22nd to hear Amy Bateman, British Life Photographer of the Year, provide a fascinating and humorous account of how she gathered the photographs and stories for her book *Forty Farms*. A fast-moving and inspiring talk including insights into how many of the photographs used in *Forty Farms* were captured, was well received by the audience who enjoyed the accompanying presentation of images and film. To add to her previous awards and accolades, Amy has also been awarded the *Hunter Davies Lakeland Book of the Year 2023* prize for the book and has also recently won the *Women in Agriculture* category at the *Cumbrian Farmer Awards 2023*.

Maulds Meaburn Village Institute has recently started a new season of talks by notable speakers from Cumbria and beyond and at this first talk of the current series, every available ticket was pre-reserved. The evening included a raffle of a copy of *Forty Farms*, the prize having been donated by Dave Felton of *Inspired by Lakeland*, who published the book. Local villagers provided an impressive array of home-baked biscuits to accompany tea and coffee after the talk and the Institute's bar also did a brisk trade. Proceeds from the talks series contribute towards the running costs of the Institute. Reporting a Problem about Roads & Verges

Westmorland and Furness Council is responsible for the maintenance of roads and highway verges. Members of the public can report a fault easily online and add photos via the Westmorland and Furness council's website.

<u>www.westmorlandandfurness.gov.uk/parking-streets-and-transport/streets-roads-and-pavements</u>

An advantage of logging the fault via the online service is that people can provide their email address and receive automatic progress updates direct to their inbox.

The Highways team will then assess the fault and where possible repair it or as a minimum make it safe in line with the council's agreed standards.

You can report a problem with:

- potholes and road damage
- drains, gullies and flooding
- trees, hedges, weeds and grass
- bollards
- manhole covers, gully grates and kerbs
- road signs and markings
- pedestrian crossings, traffic signals and street lights
- road structures such as bridges and subways
- road debris and obstructions
- winter maintenance

You can also report a problem to Westmorland and Furness Council by phone.

For issues like obstructions (gates tied or locked, stiles blocked etc), misleading signs, or to ask about larger access projects, contact Area Ranger Calum using calum.stott@vorkshiredales.org.uk
