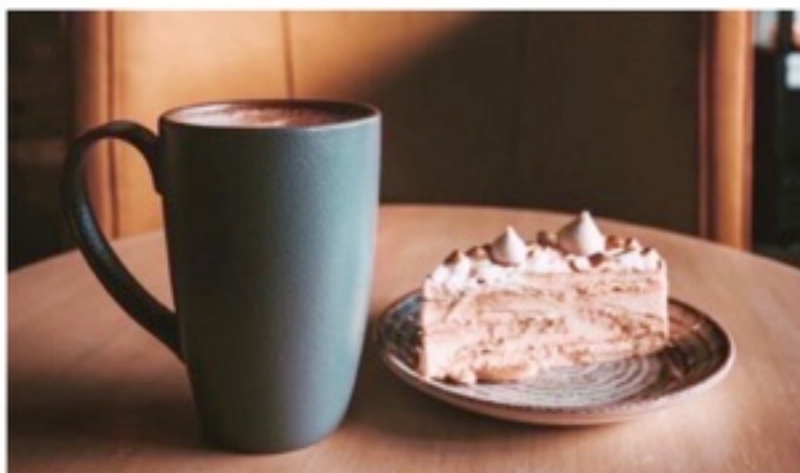

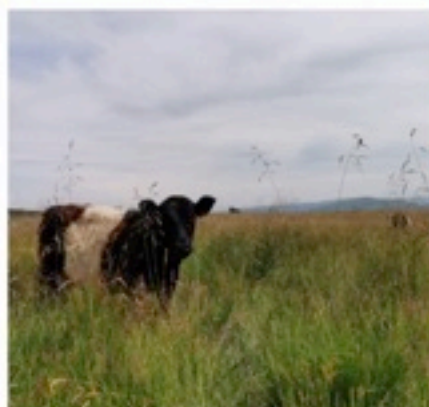

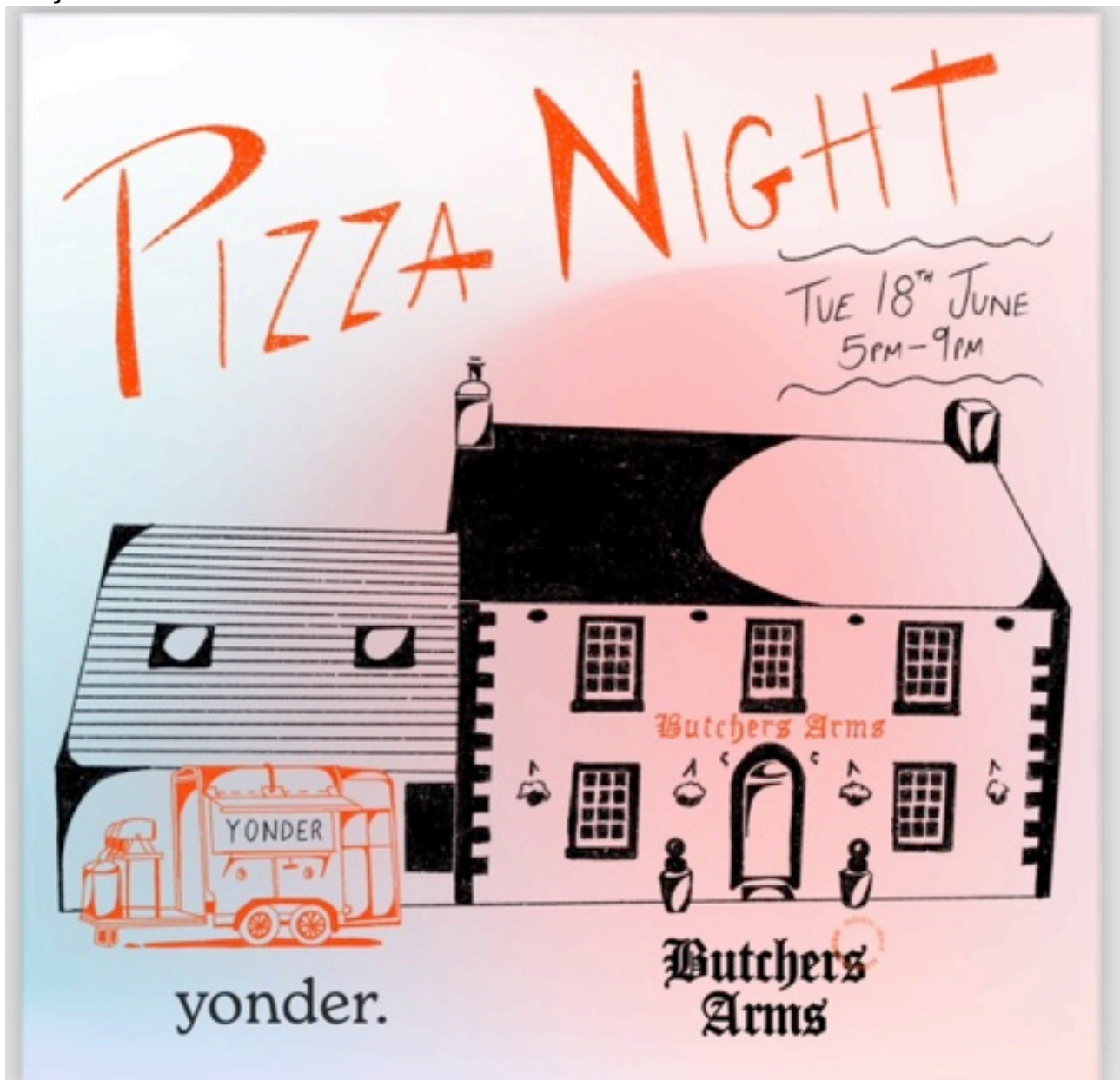

A Look in the Past

Recently I have come by a book entitled '*Some Westmorland Villages*' which was compiled in 1957 by members of the Women's Institute throughout the county. It provides interesting facts about forty-eight villages within the county and has quite a lengthy piece about Crosby Ravensworth and Maulds Meaburn. Reagill is also covered, but is listed with Sleagill in its own chapter. Of note are the small sketches that appear throughout the book and which were penned by a Miss F.E. Hawkins of Crosby Ravensworth.

I won't quote the two relevant chapters word for word, but will include all the points of interest and will do so over several editions of The Link. And just possibly upon reading this some of you may have further info' to add.

Amongst a number of curiosities, we learn about a blacksmith in Crosby Ravensworth who had a pet fox, 'cow doctors', a bowling green, the devil and somewhere called Liqourice Hill. Also how the pope became involved in local matters in Reagill!

Unfortunately though, the name of the author of the Crosby Ravensworth and Maulds Meaburn entry is not given.

The books starts with details about **Crosby Hall** – at one time when in possession of the Pickering family in the sixteenth century, an imposing fortified building, complete with massive tower, protective walls and a moat. It was surrounded by fine sycamore trees which still remain and which must be something like 300 years old.

The house was rebuilt within the last 150 to 200 years.

It had a ghost or '*dobbie*', a supernatural being which sometimes took the form of a sheeted skeleton, sometimes that of a white bull which had the very unpleasant and disturbing habit of licking the window-panes of the house.

It chiefly haunted the tower and fortunately, for the peace of mind of the tenant and neighbours, vanished when the tower was demolished.

However, it did not do so until it had thoughtfully disclosed to the owner the whereabouts of a hidden treasure, and, less tactfully, told him the exact time and manner of his death(*).

Crosby Hall was bought from the Lowthers a few years ago and is now owned and farmed by Mrs Todd and her son Guy Todd.

***Ed:** I feel that the sentence should have at least finished with an exclamation mark.
Alas it does not tell us of what the treasure was nor the manner of death!

Meaburn Hall – is built on the site of an old manor house and is itself a very lovely building, parts dating from the early seventeenth century, others from later in the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries.

But the general impression as one looks at is of an Elizabethan house.

It has a long history, all connected with the Lowther family and at one time it had extensive and beautiful pleasure gardens, a bowling green, of which the remains can be seen, with two neat and very attractive little stone summer-houses in which players could rest and regale themselves between games.

Adjoining the house was a fine deer-park, the high walls are still to be seen.

It is now a substantial farm-house, lovely and secluded and incidentally the haunt of antiquarians from near and far.

Next month – *‘Farming and farming changes’*

Moving onto **Reagill**:

In 1212 Reagill Grange was granted to Shap Abbey and a few monks lived there to produce food and collect wool from the surrounding district and deliver them to the abbey.

However, a complaint was sent to the Pope in Rome that the Abbott of Shap over-exacted the tithes of Renegill (Reagill) Chapel and, after investigation, the Pope wrote in 1224 that Shap abbey must pay six skeps of oatmeal a year to Crosby church for all old lands used: but for new land broken up there need be no payment. At that time the Grange was linked to the Manor-house at Barnskew by a rough road and by a further road to Appleby.

In 1315 Shap Abbey exported wool direct to Flanders for weaving (10 sacks a year at £6 a sack, just as it came from the fold.)

'End of Term report' winter 2023/24



Volunteers hedge planting on Trainlands

In response to falling volunteer numbers in the last two years we decided to organise a series of 'Beer and Bacon' events through the planting season.

We put out a series of six dates in October and then publicised each event locally on Facebook and with posters. Each event required three hours of work in return for a pint and a bacon sandwich.

The result was six very enjoyable work / social events which helped to increase our volunteer hours for the year from 500 to 650.

We did, however, still need to get some external help with hedge planting and thanks go to Susie Grainger and her team for their support.



Wickerslack plantation

Wickerslack plantation was our biggest project this year. 950 trees planted along a quarter mile bank to add to the 250 we planted last year.

Work completed this year is as follows:-

Barnskew 325m hedging, 30 trees

Brackenslack (Bowness) 214m hedging, 10 trees

Brackenslack Farm	198m hedging, 10 trees
Townhead	115m hedging, 310 trees
Trainlands	352m hedging, 35 trees
Woodfoot	210m hedging, 60 trees
Wickerslack	950 trees
Wyebourne	80 trees



The winter of 2023/24 will be remembered as the wettest we have experienced since we started tree planting. Underfoot conditions were so soft that we experienced significant delays to fence installation and were unable to complete 84m of hedging and 88 trees as fencing and tree crates couldn't be completed

The headline statistics for winter 2023/24 planting are:-

1485 Trees

8484 Hedging plants in

1414 metres of Hedging

Funding

As always none of this work could have been achieved without funding and so again we must thank all our funders:-

YDNPA FIPL was again our biggest funder in 2023/24 at just over £44k

Woodland Trust provided hedging plants, canes and spirals for Barnskew

Westmorland and Furness Council granted us £6k from various funds

Tesco awarded us £500 from their 'Stronger starts' scheme

Regular Contributors donated £250 this year.

A selection of the trees planted in our first years. There are few footpaths in the village that don't pass some of our work and the results are very satisfying.

As always we are planning for next season and have made FIPL applications for trees and hedging on Brackenslack, Town Head and Midtown Farm. Unfortunately at the time of writing our applications have been approved but YDNPA have run out of funding so we will need to tailor our plans to match any funding we can put in place.

In the meantime, as well as fund raising, we continue with checking our planting to date and are carrying out maintenance as required.

As always we have plenty of opportunities for volunteers.

And finally the numbers to date

In the five years since the group was formed we have planted:-

6543 Trees

37698 Hedging plants in

6283 metres of Hedging (nearly 4 miles!)
